SAINT PETER CHANEL, Priest and Martyr (1803-1841)

The first martyr in Oceania, where he was ministering in New Hebrides.

SAINT LOUIS MARY DE MONTFORT, Priest (1673-1716)

Devout from his youth, Louis entered a Paris seminary after walking 130 miles in the rain. While recuperating from a deliberate poisoning, he wrote *True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin*.

SAINT CATHERINE OF SIENA, Doctor of the Church (1347-1380)

Deeply loving God from her youth, Catherine entered the Third Order of St. Dominic. She fought for the rights of the Roman Pontiff and promoted the renewal of religious life. Her spiritual writings are classics of Christian mysticism.

The **World Meeting of Families** is an international event, begun by St. John Paul II in 1994. FROM THE HOLY SEE

THE HOLY FATHER'S PRAYER INTENTIONS

Each month **His Holiness** asks for general and missionary prayer intentions. For **May 2015**, the Holy Father's prayer intentions are:

Universal: *Help for Neighbors*

That, rejecting the culture of indifference, we may care for our neighbors who suffer, especially the sick and the poor.

Missionary: *Secularization*

That Mary's intercession may help Christians in secularized cultures be ready to proclaim Jesus.

HOW DID THE POPE SPEND HOLY WEEK?

VATICAN CITY — *To enter the mystery of Easter, one must humble oneself, not be afraid of reality and seek to live in the service of others.*

This was Pope Francis' central message as he led the Church for his third Easter celebrations as pope.

In his message and blessing *urbi et orbi* (to the city of Rome and to the world), he called on the Lord to bring peace to numerous countries experiencing conflict and terrorism today, especially in Africa and the Middle East.

Holy Thursday

Pope Francis began by telling clergy that he often thinks and prays about their weariness, which they all experience, stressing this fatigue is "like incense, which silently rises up to heaven," "goes straight to the heart of the Father" and is of "greatest concern" to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

That evening, the Pope was driven to Rebibbia prison on the outskirts of Rome, where he celebrated the Mass of the Lord's Supper and washed the feet of six men and six women, including a mother with a small child.

Via Crucis

In his meditation after leading the *Via Crucis* (*Way of the Cross*) at the Colosseum in Rome on **Good Friday**, the Pope explained how the humiliation and terrible suffering of Jesus on the cross makes each person aware of his or her own sins.

Holy Saturday

At the Easter vigil in St. Peter's Basilica, the Pope emphasized that Easter cannot be lived "without entering into the mystery" of the holy event. It's not "something intellectual," but "much more" than that: It demands not being "afraid of reality" and "locked into ourselves." It means going "beyond our comfort zone, beyond the laziness and indifference which hold us back."

Easter Sunday

The Holy Father returned to the mystery of Easter in his *urbi et orbi* address, stressing the need to emulate Peter and John, who "bent down" in order to enter Jesus' tomb on Easter morning. Similarly, "we need to 'bend down,' to abase ourselves," in order to "understand the glorification of Jesus" and "follow him on his way."

Call for Peace

The Pope then called for peace and help from the international community in a variety of trouble spots in the world today.

LIVES OF THE SAINTS: Saint Catherine of Siena



Born: 25 MAR 1347
Died: 29 APR 1380
Feast Day: April 29th

WHAT THE WORLD WAS LIKE

Catherine was born in the late Middle Ages, a time of great change in the world and for the Church. The bubonic plague, a deadly and contagious disease often called The Black Death, spread across Europe and killed one third of the population. Also during Catherine's lifetime, the pope, who had always lived in Rome, was living in France, which caused problems for the Church. It was also the beginning of the Renaissance, a revival of classical art, architecture, literature, and learning that began in Italy. The Hundred Years War between France and England began and the first cannons were used in battle. During Catherine's lifetime, the technique of knitting was introduced.

WHO SHE WAS

Catherine was from a very large family. She had twenty-five brothers and sisters. Her family lived in Northern Italy. Her father was a wool dyer and her mother ran the household and took care of all the children. Catherine did not go to school and did not have a formal education.

When she was very young, Catherine began to find quiet places where she could pray and talk to God. At the age of sixteen, she joined the Third Order of Dominican nuns. She wore their habit and lived in a small room in her parents' home. Catherine spent three years in this room, praying. After this time, she began to serve those who were sick and poor. People began to visit her because they wanted to follow her example of living in God's love.

There were many disagreements in the Church during Catherine's life. The pope was living in France instead of Rome. Catherine believed that God wanted the disagreements to end so she began to write to the pope. She convinced the Pope to move back to Rome.

Catherine continued to write letters to all kinds of people, from the poorest in the land to the richest and most famous. It was considered a miracle that Catherine was able to write well because she never attended school. In her letters, Catherine encouraged people to live in peace.

4. TRUE. According to the Code of Canon Law (Canon 1246), "Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church."
5. FALSE. Jesus is mentioned several times in Acts, particularly by St. Peter.
6. FALSE. There is no version of the Holy Bible that mentions a horse, only that Saul was "struck to the ground."
7. TRUE. There are 73 books in a Catholic Bible, but only 66 in other (e.g., Protestant) Bibles. Those extra 7 books are called the "deuterocanonical" books of the Old Testament: Tobit, Judith, Wisdom, Sirach, Baruch, 1 and 2 Maccabees, and Esther.
